METHODOLOGY

Echelon Insights conducted a survey on behalf of Future 42 to understand awareness and perceptions of Washington's recent state legislative activity. The survey was fielded from June 5-7, 2023 in English among a sample of 600 registered voters in Washington state using probability sampling. Thirty percent of respondents were interviewed via live caller on landline and the remaining 70% were contacted via text message to complete the survey online.

The sample was weighted to population benchmarks for registered voters in the 2024 Likely Electorate in Washington state on gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, region, party, turnout probability, and 2020 vote. All benchmarks for the 2024 Likely Electorate in Washington state were adjusted for turnout estimates based on a probabilistic model of the likely 2024 electorate derived from the L2 voter file.

Estimates for gender, age, region, and party were derived from the L2 voter file. Estimates for race/ethnicity and education were derived from the US Census Bureau's American Community Survey demographic data adjusted to match voter registration estimates from the November 2020 Current Population Survey Voting and Registration Supplement.

Calculated the way it would be for a random sample and adjusted to incorporate the effect of weighting, the margin of sampling error is \pm 5.0 percentage points.
